


Emerging Needs

Skills and Underemployment

- 26.7% of immigrants have university degrees compared to 10.9% of Canadian-born
- Immigrants with foreign credentials are affected. 2/3 of recent immigrants hold degrees from outside of Canada
- 44% of immigrants have relevant work experience that match their education
- Employers often undervalue international experience and credentials



Public Opinion on Immigration

- 57% of immigrants and 60% of non-immigrants agree there are too many immigrants.
- Non-white respondents are more likely to feel there are too many immigrants (61%) compared to white respondents (58%).
- Younger people (18-34) are less likely to think there are too many immigrants (55%) compared to those aged 35-54 (65%) and 55+ (63%).



Public Trust

- 42% of Canadians trust immigrants, while only 36% trust refugees.
- Among those who think there are too many immigrants, trust drops to 32% for immigrants and 24% for refugees.
- White respondents (37%) are more likely to trust refugees than non-white respondents (33%).
- Immigrants (53%) are more likely to trust other immigrants than are non-immigrants (40%), and non-white respondents (53%) are more likely to trust immigrants than white respondents (40%).
- However, immigrants (33%) and non-white respondents (33%) are somewhat less likely to trust refugees than non-immigrants (38%) and white respondents (37%).
- 22% of non-immigrants distrust immigrants, compared to 14% of immigrants. 28% of non-white respondents distrust refugees, compared to 22% of white respondents.

I wanted to say that we have been immigrating for more than 20 years and we live here, work and pay taxes. We did not come here to leave, although i think you, yourself are apparently an immigrant.

So it is better to be kind to each other and not let tension arise in the society.

Yesterday, on the bus, my son and his friend—both Latino children were approached by a white folk who told them they would soon be deported. He claimed Trump was "making things right" and said he couldn't wait for deportations to begin ir Canada.

My son and his friend chose to ignore him, but I'm sharing this to remind our community, especially BIPOC individuals—to stay aware. I fear this kind of hate will only become more common.

Fear and hate spread quickly, but love and kindness will keep our hearts from turning to anger. Take care of your children. Speak out against racism, especially when it targets the most vulnerable—like these two kids who did nothing to deserve such harassment.
